

HISTORIC PRESERVATION IN GENERAL AND THE RECTORY SCHOOL BARN



A new state law holds some interesting possibilities for the future of preservation in our state. It was passed last year and is called the "Connecticut Village Districts Act". Since zoning is often the key to success or failure of preservation, we note that this new law is appended to state zoning statutes. Now local planning commissions are empowered to establish districts anywhere they deem it appropriate to preserve a neighborhood's character. A N. Y. Times article implies that the law was in response to the 1990s practice of altering existing 20th century homes in established neighborhoods with modest yards. That 1990s practice is to replace a modest home with a huge "trophy" home which looms out of all proportion to the surrounding houses. This law provides legal muscle to local planning and zoning boards to reject proposals which are deemed destructive of the integrity of a neighborhood. It is revealing to see that support for the law comes from Connecticut communities as dispersed as Greenwich in the southwest and Brooklyn in the northeast. In Hamden, the endangered neighborhoods of upper Whitney Avenue and lower State Street immediately come to mind.



SOCIETY LIBRARY COLLECTION

The Library continues to grow, often from sources and through means which cannot be predicted. From the home of the late Elinor Shelomis, we have received several items of interest concerning lves Street and the lves family that was so important in the 19th century industrial development of Hamden.



The collection of materials includes a late 19th century portrait of James Ives to the left. James Ives was the namesake for the failed Historic District proposed for the Ives Street area a few years ago. Included are several booklets setting forth the activities of the Mount Carmel Women's Club from 1940s to 1970s. Also included are some fifty-year old Hamden newspapers and of special interest are several 19th century photos of members of the Ives family. Most intriguing is what seems to be a mid-19th century, photo-like picture of a married couple labeled Elam Ives and Thankful Cooper Ives.

Society member Franz Douskey noticed that these items were in danger of being lost from the historic Elam Ives House and he arranged their donation to the Society. Thank you Franz and to the heirs of Elinor Shelomis. We also gratefully acknowledge a generous contribution from Susan J. Moore, her mother Ann Cassidy and her sister Denise Mustico in memory of Ms. Shelomis.
