Dear Members:

Over the last few years, the Society has been advocating preservation of the 1790 Elam Ives House at its present location and thereby avoiding its destruction by removal or demolition. Last year the property's owner, the Regional Water Authority, entered into an agreement with the Town of Hamden to achieve that purpose. The Town has the responsibility to maintain, restore, and use the historic structure with environmental restrictions. The Society was given a grant to hire a professional researcher to complete a nomination application to place the house on the National Register of Historic Places; this nomination now awaits the approval of the CT Preservation Office. Another grant was received to research and prepare information for the creation of an historic district in the immediate area known as "Ivesville."

Our public advocacy for saving the Ives House brought correspondence of support for our now successful efforts and among those letters was included the following poem by Christopher T. Walker titled "IVESVILLE JINGLE."

School Tours





Jepp's Brook Mill Site

The Society has been awarded a Historic Preservation Technical Assistance Grant in the amount of \$3,024 from the CT Trust for Historic Preservation. This is a matching grant of which the Regional Water Authority has donated \$500 and the Society will contribute \$500. The grant will be used to nominate the Jepp's Brook Site for the CT State Register and as a CT State Archaeological Preserve. The Hamden Historical Properties Commission is a co-sponsoring organization and will contribute in-kind services. Past, Inc. has been hired to photograph, map, and research the site; it will complete the applications for designation, submitting them by March 2008. The Society hopes to schedule a public tour on the site area in the late spring.
