Most of the minutes are Hamden trivia most of us have never heard. However, together, the Board has gathered all kinds of fun facts about Hamden over the centuries. Below is a glimpse of three of the most recent "Minutes".

"Dog Lane Court: In the 1700s, some of the funnier people in Mount Carmel banded together in an early comedy society called Dog Lane Court. They would gather together for meetings...."
"The Rectory School: In 1843, the Reverend C. W. Everett founded a private school for boys in Hamden...."

"The Loose Goose: One of the early laws in Hamden responded to the problem of loose geese..."

Hamden Historic Resource Inventory Nearing Completion

Thanks to a generous grant from the Connecticut State Historic Preservation Office, the Hamden Historic Properties Commission was able to hire a team of professional consultants to conduct a survey of Hamden's historic structures. The last such survey was done thirty years ago. With this new survey approaching its conclusion, the consultant's report:

"With guidance from the Hamden Historic Properties Commission, the survey team for the update of the 1985 Historic Resource Inventory has been working on two general tacks: fleshing out neighborhoods, such as Whitneyville and Spring Glen, that are candidates for National Register districts, and "Having ascertained that 34 of the 510 properties included in the 1985 survey had since been demolished, the team is adding approximately 335 historic properties to Hamden's inventory...."

identifying resources in less well documented neighborhoods such as Beecher Heights, Norwood, and Hamden Plains.

Having ascertained that 34 of the 510 properties included in the 1985 survey had since been demolished, the team is adding approximately 335 historic properties to Hamden's inventory, and appending the independently documented surveys of the Cedars development in Whitneyville and the Hamden portfolio of early 20th century local female architect Alice Washburn.

Among the interesting findings of the current survey are the c. 1929 home of the first physician to use penicillin in a US hospital, 1920s vernacular housing with Craftsman influences in Hamden Plains, several subdivisions of brick capes by a Branford developer in the three years immediately following WWII, the mid-century modern home designed by a Yale professor for his family, and that the majority of custom designs by Alice Washburn are located in Spring Glen East and West."



For a second year, **Hamden Historical Society** will be participating in a state-wide event, Open House Day, on Saturday June 9 from 1:00-4:00 p.m.
